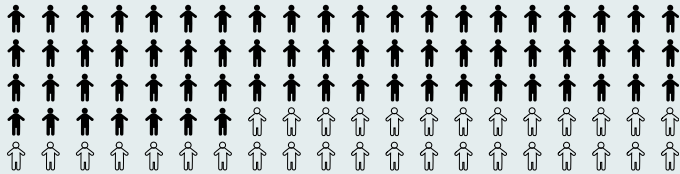

Peace Corps Has Returned

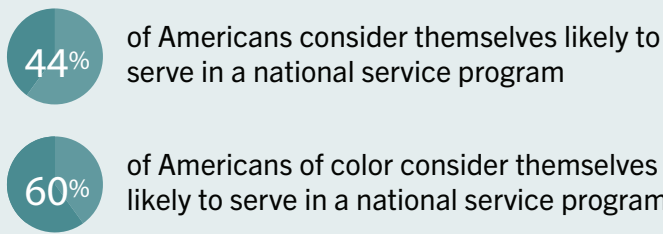
Americans support the mission.

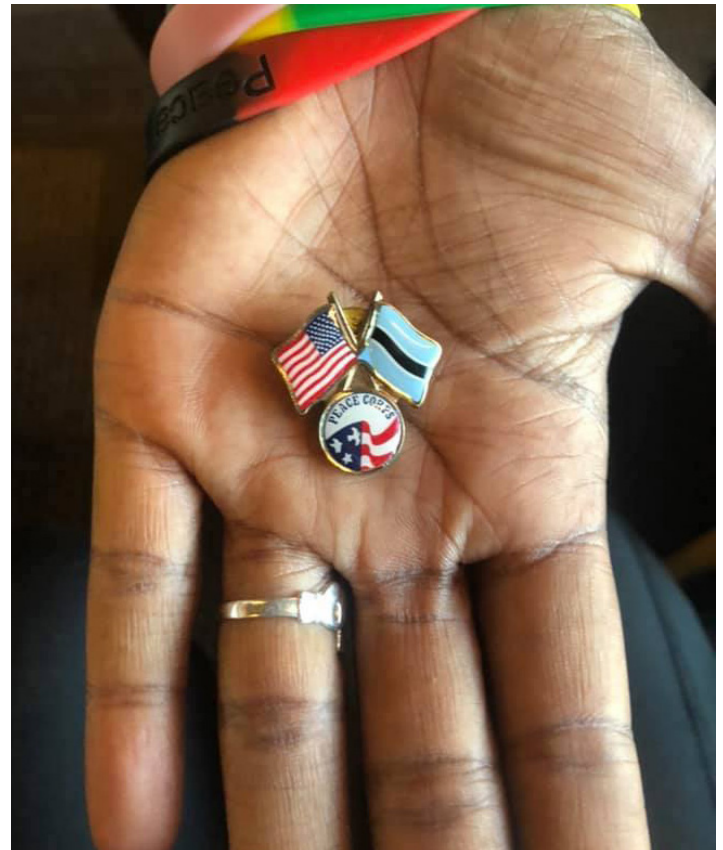
The Return of Volunteers to Service

Peace Corps Volunteers are returning to serve alongside communities throughout the world. Now 1,200 Volunteers and trainees have returned to 51 countries around the globe, with more expected to return in the months ahead. The new Viet Nam program officially began receiving Volunteers in October 2022.

In the report “Peace Corps Connect to the Future,” the Peace Corps community provided key recommendations for the the agency, Congress, and the wider Peace Corps community, on how to reimagine, reshape, and retool the Peace Corps. The agency has taken these recommendations to heart. Now’s the time for Congress to pass legislation and ensure that Peace Corps Volunteers have the support to serve around the world as well as bring their knowledge and experience back home to strengthen communities and institutions across the United States.

The Domestic Dividend

“Eighty-six percent of Returned Peace Corps Volunteers (RPCVs) continued to volunteer after Peace Corps service, nearly double the number reported in earlier studies. RPCVs are also three times more likely to volunteer than the average American. . .Of those respondents, sixty-seven percent have served in leadership positions in organizations through service on a single or multiple boards of directors.”
